Orange Warsaw Festival

Orange Warsaw Festival

is the full name of the festival.

Orange is in the name of the festival because the company Orange is the main sponsor of the festival.

Warsaw is the name of the festival because the festival is in Warsaw.

Festival is a cultural event for a large number of people.

In this text, you will see **OWF** a lot.

OWF is short for Orange Warsaw Festival.

We use **OWF** also on the festival website, on the internet and in the media.



OWF is a music festival.

A music festival is many concerts that are in 1 place and for a few days at a time.

Orange Warsaw Festival is 1 time a year.

It lasts for 2 days.

In 2025 it is on the 30th and 31st of May.



Accessibility

We make the Orange Warsaw Festival so that everyone feels comfortable and safe.
And this is how it has been for many years now.
Thanks to this, you will meet very different people with different disabilities at the festival.
That's why it's often said that the Orange Warsaw Festival is accessible!

Moving between the different sites is comfortable.

There are no architectural barriers.

There are no thresholds or stairs, for example.

People with disabilities can enter the festival through the **Priority Service Point**.

During the festival, you can also use:

- Audio description of selected concerts.
- Support from an assistant.
- Sign language interpretation.



Festival Town

The festival town is the entire festival area.

The festival grounds include:

- 2 stages with concerts.
- A building with silent disco.
- A lot of stands selling drinks, alcohol and food.
- Toilets, including accessible toilets.

There are also places where you can sit and relax and meet other people.

Walking between the different venues is easy thanks to pavements, paved surface and ramps and overruns.

You will meet security, festival organisers and volunteers at the festival site.



OWF Stages

There are 2 stages at OWF where there are concerts.

The OWF stages are:

1. Orange Stage

This is a large open-air stage.

It is also referred to as the main stage or the big stage. The Orange Stage is pictured on the right.

2. Warsaw Stage

This is the smaller stage.

This stage is under the big tent.

There are accessibility zones next to the stages.

You can read more about this

Silent disco

There is also **silent disco** at the festival.

DJs play at silent disco.

People dance and have fun, but the music is only on headphones.


Everyone has their own headphones.

You can choose the music to dance to.

Silent Disco is in a building.

The building is called **Tribune II**.

In a silent disco building, there can be lots of colours, lights and a crowd of people.



Important information

The Orange Warsaw Festival is a mass event.

This means that there are a lot of people there.

For this reason, special rules of behaviour

apply to everyone.

You will read about them on the following pages of this text.

The safety of the audience is ensured by the organisers and **security guards**.

You can recognise **the security guards** by their clothing. They wear clothes with the word OCHRONA on them.
They also have a badge.

Security can ask you to change your behaviour, but only if you pose a danger to other people.



To enter the festival grounds **you must buy a ticket**. And exchange your ticket for a **festival wristband**.

You are not allowed to bring your food and drink into the OWF festival area.

Food and drink you bought outside the festival area must be left in front of the entrance.

You can buy your drink and food in the festival area.

There will be food, drink and alcohol stalls here.

Important: You can only pay by card at the festival.

Only people with diabetes can bring their food and drink.

For the safety of everyone, you are not allowed to bring the following into the festival area:

- glass containers,
- alcohol and drugs,
- fireworks.
