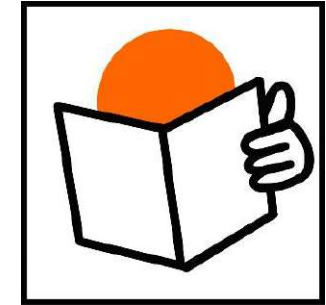

Easy-to-read texts about Orange Warsaw Festival

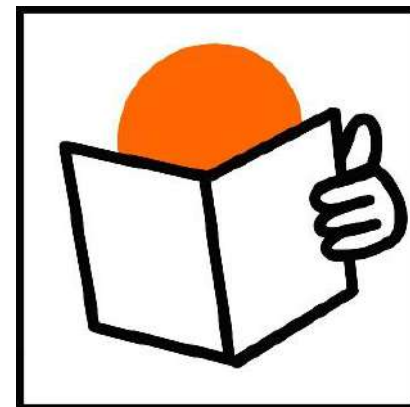
We wrote 3 Easy-to-read texts about the Orange Warsaw Festival:

How to get to the festival site

Orange Warsaw Festival

is on the grounds of **Służewiec Race Track**.

Address: 266 Puławska Street, 02-684 Warsaw.

You can get to the festival site in various ways.

Choose a way that is safe and comfortable for you.

You can get to the festival site by:

1. By public transport
2. By car: someone can drop you off / give you a lift
3. By car and you can park it in the car park.

Note: You will then need to buy
a separate parking ticket.

4. By taxi.

You can also arrive on foot or by other means,
for example by city bike, scooter..



Public transport

The fastest way to get to the festival is via the **M1 metro line**.

Get off at **METRO WILANOWSKA station**.

At the station, you can change to:

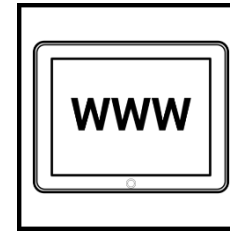
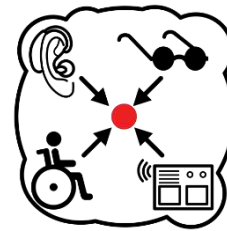
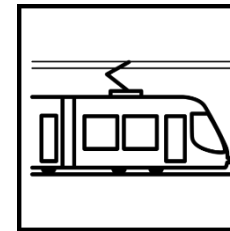
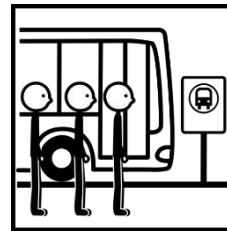
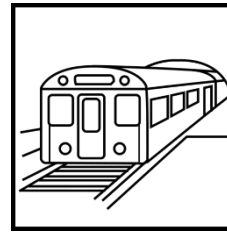
- Buses, lines: 192, 709, 727, 739 and 300.
- Trams, lines: 4 and 75.

From the bus and tram, get off at the stop: **WYŚCIGI**.

If you are wearing a **festival wristband**,
you do not need to buy a ticket.

- You have free transport rides in Warsaw on:
- 2 June,
- 3 June
- 4 June, until 4:00 am.



Car or taxi: someone is giving you a lift

If someone is giving you a lift to the festival grounds,
go to the side gate of the Race Track.

This is on Wyścigowa Street.

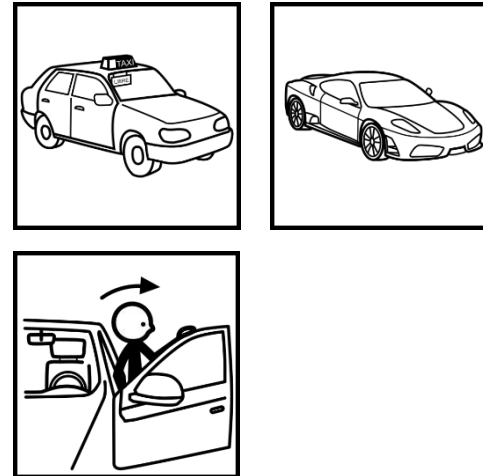
The car (taxi) can only stand there when you get out.

This arrangement is called “**Kiss & Ride**”.

The ‘Kiss & Ride’ location is marked by
a blue board with a pictogram and the words “Kiss & Ride”.

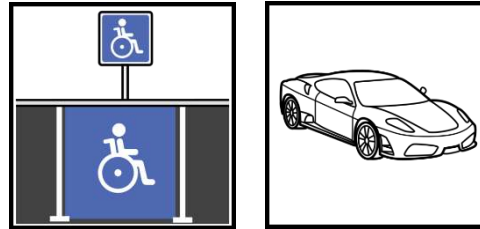
Note: if you have an N-ticket you can get to the Priority Service Point.

Show security the N ticket.



Car: parking

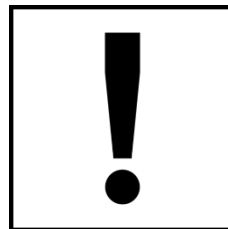
You can come to the OWF area with a car.
You will then need to buy an additional ticket:
Parking Ticket N.



Please note: You must buy your ticket
before arriving at the OWF grounds.

If you want to use a parking space
you must have 3 documents:

1. Ticket N,
2. Valid Parking Card
3. Parking Ticket N.



Entry to Służewiec Race Track

To enter the festival grounds you must enter the Track.

The main entrance is on Puławska Street.

Walk to this location from the public transport stop.

When you are on the Racecourse Grounds go to the **Priority Service Point**.

You can ask security or volunteers where the Priority Service Point is.

The distance between the Race Track gate and the festival gates is about 500 metres.

The walk takes about 5 minutes.

Remember that **you can use assisted transport**.



Assisted transport

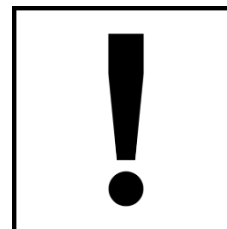
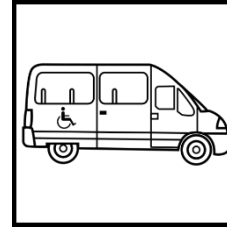
You can use **supported transport** at the Orange Warsaw Festival.

Supported transport will take you from under the main gate of Służewiec Race Track. It is on Puławska Street.

Assisted transport will help you get to the Priority Service Point

If you want to use assisted transport, approach a volunteer at the gate and say so.

If you need help getting around the OWF site, ask for assistance.



Priority Service Point

People with disabilities and their companions enter the festival grounds through the Priority Service Point.

The Priority Service Point is a white, labeled in Polish tent.

See the picture on the right.

At the Priority Service Point you can exchange your category N ticket for a **festival wristband**.

At the Priority Service Point you can:

- Take audio description equipment.
- Communicate in sign language.
- Take noise-cancelling headphones.
- Ask for help and assistance.



Getting around the festival site

The Orange Warsaw Festival concerts are in the car park at Służewiec Race Track.

Much of the area is pavement, concrete or cobblestone. Or paved gravel and sand.

Walking between the various venues on the festival grounds is comfortable.

There are no architectural barriers: thresholds, stairs, for example.

Crossing the grounds is easy because there are ramps, lifts and artificial surfaces.



Assistance at the festival site

If you need it, a personal assistant can support you on the festival grounds.

A personal assistant helps you, for example, to move between accessibility areas and to the food stalls

Assistants are Festival Volunteers.

They are trained and able to talk to people with disabilities.

Volunteers wear black or orange t-shirts.

On their backs, there are words **VOLUNTEER** or **ORANGE FOUNDATION VOLUNTEER**.



Return: public transport

How you get back from the festival depends on you.

It also depends on what time you return from the festival.

There are only night bus lines in Warsaw after 11pm.

There is a night bus line called N34 that runs next to the festival.

There will also be a line called **DO METRA**.

The DO METRA line will run from 23:00 to 3:00.

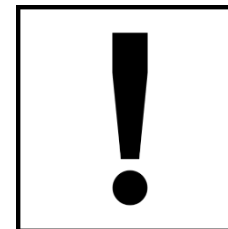
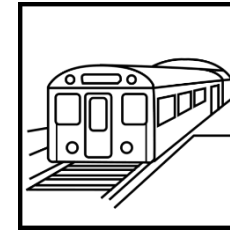
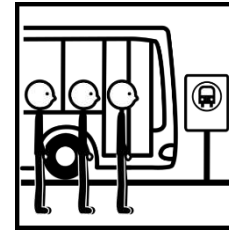
That line will take you to the URSYNÓW metro station.

Please note: after the concerts, all the people leave.

It's crowded.

Everyone goes in the same direction.

It is also crowded on public transport.



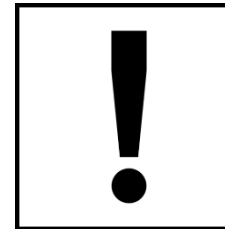
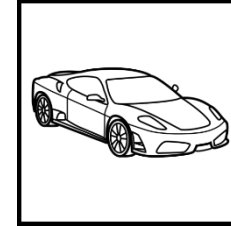
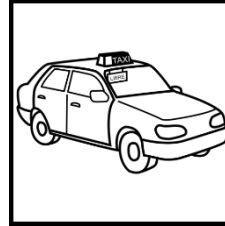
Return: car or taxi

You can return from the festival by taxi or car.

You can take a taxi or a car
at the 'Kiss & Ride' area on Wyścigowa Street.

Please note: returning by car or taxi can be difficult.

Late at night, **Wyścigowa Street will be closed**
at the end of the concerts.



Support during festival

If you want to ask for something, if you need support look for:

1. People wearing a t-shirt with the word volunteer on it.
2. People in uniform or with the word security on their clothes.

You can always get help:

- A. At the Priority Service Point.
- B. On the platforms by the stages.
